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
Historical memory: Tsushima Island is our land!!



Tsushima Island in Map Texts


- How did various maps produced in Choson Korea depict the Japanese archipelago, and in particular Tsushima Island?
- * There are two forms of depiction of Tsushima Island expressed in two major discourses.
- * I will discuss the relationship between those discourses and history.



Discourse One

* This discourse asserts that Tsushima Island was an important island for Chosŏn, although it does not state that the island was originally Chosŏn territory. It clearly considers Tsushima Island part of Japan..




Discourse Two

* In discourse two, Tsushima Island was usually depicted as Chosŏn territory. Tsushima Island was an indispensable element of Chosŏn maps.



Influence of Discourse Two

- The notion that Tsushima Island was part of Chosŏn also existed in China. Tsushima Island was clearly depicted in maps of Chosŏn.
- * There are also a number of maps of Choson published in Japan during the Edo period, and even in those maps Tsushima Island was depicted as Choson territory. Even more surprising, similar maps appeared in the early Meiji period.

Yŏjido 輿地図

* In maps, it is telling whether Tsushima Island is made part of Chosŏn or placed outside Chosŏn.

 Discourse number one and discourse number two cannot be expressed in a single map; they are logically exclusive.

However, these two discourses do coexist in a form of atlas, the Yŏjido, of which many examples exist.





Two Discourses in Yŏjido

Discourse One clearly appears, although in orientation, the Japanese archipelago is upside down when compared to the Haedong cheguk ch'ongdo. It reflects values that set Chosŏn at the center and the Japanese archipelago on the periphery.

Discourse Two appears in the same way as in the examples already presented.

Look at History

- In Discourse One, the Chosŏn court's relations with the Tsushima Islanders can be seen as foreign relations.
- In Discourse Two, there were several ways in which the Choson court treated Tsushima Island as domestic territory.

The Ouei Invasion in 1419

- * T'aejong, the abdicated king of Chosŏn, announced that Tsushima Island was originally a part of Chosŏn, but it had been occupied by the Japanese.
- * The Choson court treated Tsushima Islanders differently from other Japanese during the campaign.
- * The Muromachi bakufu and the Kyushu Deputy acquiesced with Chosŏn's policy.

Other Examples

- ★ The lords of Tsushima Island became seal recipients of the King of Chosŏn. 受図書人
- * Chosŏn Investigation Officials were dispatched to Tsushima Island. 敬差官
- ♣ The Oouchi called Tsushima Island Chosŏn's pasture land. 朝鮮牧場之地
- The lord of Tsushima Island, Sou Shigemoto, was almost appointed as a Chosŏn military post recipient. 受職人

Conclusion

* Discourse Two is a visual representation of power of the King of Choson over Tsushima Island, which authorizes the maritime activities of Tsushima Islanders. Not only has this discourse generally dropped from memory, but more importantly, so has the fact that the Muromachi Bakufu acquiesced to this distribution of power. Consequently, the Yŏjido's dual representation can be considered historically the most accurate.
